Writing Haiku: The Rules and When They Matter Julia Wakefield

There are many rules associated with Japanese haiku that have changed and evolved over time. When people began to write haiku in different languages, the rules became even more convoluted, and there are constant amicable disputes in the Western world over what makes an effective haiku. This workshop will present some examples of prize-winning English language haiku, along with an explanation of why they work (for most people), so that you can use some of the techniques in your own writing. You don't have to be a haiku writer to join this workshop: the concepts and poetic devices can be applied to other forms of poetry.
